

Guided Sightseeing in Kathmandu

Two half day Guided sightseeing provides an ample opportunity to witness lively, vibrant and spiritually rich Kathmandu, the city of temples. It is very famous for medieval architect, culture, craftsmanship, colorful festivals and traditions. Kathmandu is the only place where one can visit 7 UNESCO cultural heritage sites within 20km. These are their three durbar squares (Kathmandu, Patan and Bhaktapur), two Buddhist stupas (Swyambhu and Bouddhanath) and two Hindu temples (Pashupati and Changunarayan). Here, we offer you the opportunity to visit three treasures of Nepal.

Sightseeing day 1: 4th March 2023, 15:00 to 18:00 hours

Brahmananda Saraswati Nagar

Nestled on the third highest hill in the Kathmandu valley, called Chandragiri, is the Maharishi Vedic Institute Pandit Campus, Brahmananda Saraswati Nagar. This campus of 5 buildings and 18 Yagya Mandaps will be home to 400 Maharishi Vedic Pandits, and Maharishi courses will be offered here.



Swyambhunath Stupa

Swyambhunath stupa is the oldest one in Kathmandu which is situated at the top of the Swyambhu hill. It is one of the crowing glories of Kathmandu Valley architecture. The perfectly proportioned monument rises through a whitewashed dome to a gilded spire, from where four iconic faces of the Buddha stare out across the valley in the cardinal direction.



Sightseeing day 2: 5th March 2023, 14:30 to 18:00 hours

Budhanilkantha Narayan- Shesa Sayan Vishnu

Here lies the Budhanilkantha, a reclining statue of Lord Vishnu on Shesa Shaiya, the largest and most beautiful stone carving in all of Nepal, also the most enigmatic. Carved from a single block of basalt stone, the Lard Vishnu statue is 5 meters in length. It is located just below of the Shivapuri hills, the origin of Bagmati ganga.

Pashupatinath Temple

Pashupatinath is one of the oldest and biggest temples in Nepal, considered as Adi Jyotirlingam, the first appeared "Radiant symbol of the Almighty". It is one of the most holy pilgrim sites in Asia for all devotees of Shiva. Built in the 5th century and later renovated by Malla kings, the site itself is said to have existed from the beginning of the previous millennium when a Shiva lingam was discovered here.
